Dumbleyung's Town Hall and Dawson Street were buzzing over the 13 April weekend for the Act Belong Commit 2024 Dumbleyung Bluebird Festival with over 800 people in attendance.

After a 5 year hiatus the previously known Taste of Dumbleyung and Gymkana proved to be as successful as ever with many visitors travelling to the event to enjoy with plenty of local attendance.

Our 3 local food stalls were kept busy throughout the event- Yabby Noodles selling out early, Dumbleyung Roadhouse having to cook extra throughout the evening and Mila's Takeaway selling plenty of food before the event even started! Dumbleyung Events Committee (DEC) John Lee said 'WOW, excellent effort- what a team!' as local volunteers rallied together to bring the event back to town. "We are so thrilled with the turnout for the event as we were unsure how the day would go after a 5 year break- it was an amazing day. We couldn't have done it without all the local volunteers and support".

The event kicked off at 3.00pm Saturday 13 April with the market stalls and free rides in full swing. The classic Fashion Parade kicked off at 4.30pm showcasing the event's favourite fashion shop Sand N Salt. Local musician Danee Bairstow kept us entertained until 5.00pm when Jeff Morts took to the outside stage and got people up and dancing before Drink N Tips commenced inside the hall until later in the evening.

Family fun, attractions, live music, over 30 stalls and food flowed all afternoon until later that night with highlights including the iconic Merry Go Round and Puffin Billy trackless train, Yabby Noodles, Dumbleyung P&C showbags, Lucky Bay Beer Van and FREE kids entertainment.

At last year's Dumbleyung Primary School ANZAC service, we spoke about the Troopers and their Remounts during WW1 in 1914-1918. We talked about the 38 ships called transporters that left Albany and Fremantle, "...all that day we watched the Australia coast fading away, till darkness shut it out, and when we got up in the morning we were out of sight of land, and nothing but the calm blue sea all around us, shimmering glass, and at last we felt we were fairly on the way to England." Private Archibald Barwick.

Then we spoke of Remount Baloo and him having to carry up to 150kgs as we cross the desert in the searing heat, sometimes at a gallop and sometimes without water for 60hrs at a stretch.

This year I will be attending on Wednesday 24th at 2pm and will talk to the students about the life of a Waler and the men from our area that were involved with the Australian Light Horse.

Please come and join us, I hear Tamara has been making ANZAC biscuits and if we have fine weather I hope to have a young Waler in attendance.





With Senior Regional Officer for the Great Southern Cheryle Dennis Stop the interruptions - take back your phone from telemarketers and spam

Unwanted calls and spam SMS can be a source of frustration. Whether it's persistent telemarketers interrupting your dinner or irrelevant promotional texts flooding your phone, there are ways to put a stop to them.

You may have forgotten about the Do Not Call register, which is a free service run by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). You can register your home, personal mobile or fax number online via donotcall.gov.au or call 1300 792 958. The good news is you only need to register once.

Telemarketers then have 30 days to stop contact. The *Do Not Call Register* legislation applies not only to Australian telemarketers but also businesses within Australia that use overseas-based telemarketers and businesses based overseas making calls to Australian numbers.

The register works by requiring telemarketers to submit a list of phone numbers they wish to call to the Register Operator. The Register identifies any numbers that are not permitted to be called and they are removed from calling lists.

Keep in mind research or survey related calls are not telemarketing, so you may still receive these, as well as calls from registered political parties, politicians, government agencies, election candidates, registered charities or educational institutions where you are or were a student. These are all exempt. However, there are still rules to be followed.

Telemarketers can only call between 9am-8pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturdays and never on Sundays. Researchers can call 9am-8.30pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturday and Sundays. Neither can call on a national public holiday.

The caller must tell you their name, the name of their employer and why they are calling and their caller ID must not be blocked. They also must end the call if you ask them to.

Unfortunately scam calls won't stop after registration. A legitimate caller should not mind if you want to verify their identity. You should never give an unsolicited caller any personal or financial information, including credit card details, or access to your computer.

Receiving an SMS about a sale from your favourite clothing store is helpful but when do 'helpful' texts turn into unwanted spam?

Marketing texts must also follow rules set out by ACMA. The business needs to have your consent, for example you ticked 'subscribe' on a form or entered a competition, include contact details and offer a way for you to unsubscribe or opt-out.

After you unsubscribe or opt-out the business must generally stop sending marketing texts within five days.

You can report spam messages to ACMA by forwarding the message to their dedicated SMS line – 0429 999 888, or you can report it online via ACMA's spam complaint form. Also consider blocking the number on your phone. ACMA does take action and most recently issued penalties of over \$3.7 million to Luxottica (Sunglass Hut, Oakley, OPSM), Uber Australia, Kmart Australia and Ticketek for breaches of spam rules.

And just like with unsolicited calls, you may still receive text messages during elections or from registered charities and other Government bodies.

Waze is a navigation app which allows you to travel stress free! The premise of the app is to provide real-time updates on road conditions, accidents, and the quickest routes to your destination. Plus, Waze will notify you of hazards and police presence along your route! Other 'Waze' users will make updates to the app when they see something notable, which will in turn update on your end. So, although this app may not be popping off in Dumbleyung, it's definitely handy in the city.



2. My Lightening Tracker & Alerts

This is a very handy app for all the farmers out there. My Lightening is the go-to app for monitoring lightning strikes inreal-time. The app features a map which displays thunderstorms, the location of lightning strikes, plus provides a history of lightning hotspots to keep an eye on.



3. SharkSmart WA

Only in WA do we need an app to keep up with shark activity! This app provides real-time updates of shark sightings and related warnings. Featuring a map of the WA coastline, you can opt to receive notifications of beach closures or shark alerts as they occur.



4. SuperCook

How many times have you opened your fridge to a bunch of random ingredients and thought to yourself 'what can I make'? Download SuperCook! This innovative gives you recipes that use up all the ingredients you have on hand. Simply enter the ingredients you have at home into the app and it will provide you with a bunch of recipes in return. Magic!



Google Tasks

Google offers many useful apps like Google Maps and Google Calendar, but Google Tasks is especially handy for keeping track of your to-do list. Gardening in Autumn

What happened to the year, I'm sure it was the middle of Summer yesterday? Now we are staring down the barrel to the end of April. Can anyone tell us when it's going to rain? It's that time of year when deciduous plants are losing their leaves and making a mess all over the yard. You can rake them up and place in the compost bin, they make great compost, or you can rake them and stick them in garbage bag for 6 months and you will have great mulch. Rake up any fallen leaves from your rose bushes and place in the bin to prevent black spot.

Now is the time to take any hardwood cuttings for propagating - with the right care these will be ready to plant out next autumn. Prune hedges climbers and native summer flowering plants. Dig up any overgrown clumps of perennials and separate ready to replant after you have added some organic matter to the soil.

Plant your tulip bulbs at the end of this month or early May along with any other spring flowering bulbs. You can also plant alyssum, snap dragon, stocks, statice and pansy just to name a few.

Now that the weather has cooled down, you can also reduce the frequency of mowing your established lawn as well as, lift the height of the mower deck. This helps keep your lawn stronger through winter. Rake out any thatch, aerate and top dress your lawn.

Now is the time to plant garlic, onions, lettuce, broccoli, cabbage, leek, peas, radish, spinach, and turnip.

Spray peach and nectarines for leaf curl. Remove any spent fruit that may be hanging on tress. Prune any summer fruiting trees that have finished fruiting.

This week's game is on Saturday 27th April at Stubbs Park Oval against Wagin at 1.30pm









RECIPE

Tomato Pesto Chicken Pasta

Ingredients:

375g pkt Fresh Fettuccine

1 tbsp Olive Oil

500g Chicken Thigh Fillets (sliced)

250g Cherry Tomatoes

290g Sundried Tomato Pesto

60g pkt Baby Rocket



Method:

Cook the 375g pkt fresh fettuccine in a large saucepan of boiling water following packet directions or until al dente. Drain, reserving ½ cup (125ml) of cooking liquid.

Meanwhile, heat 1 tbsp olive oil in a large, deep non-stick frying pan over medium-high heat. Cook half the 500g of Chicken Thigh Fillets, sliced, stirring, for 3 mins or until golden brown and cooked through. Transfer to a plate. Cover with foil to keep warm. Repeat with the remaining chicken.

Return chicken to pan with the pasta, 290g Sundried Tomato Pesto reserved cooking liquid. Season. Toss to combine. Stir in the 60g pkt Baby Rocket. Top with the tomatoes.

Add the 250g cherry tomatoes to the pan and cook for 3 mins or until the tomatoes begin to collapse. Remove from heat. Transfer tomatoes to a separate plate.

Return chicken to pan with the pasta, 290g Sundried Tomato Pesto reserved cooking liquid. Season. Toss to combine. Stir in the 60g pkt Baby Rocket. Top with the tomatoes.

Jn 14:4-6 'And where I go you know, and the way you know.'






